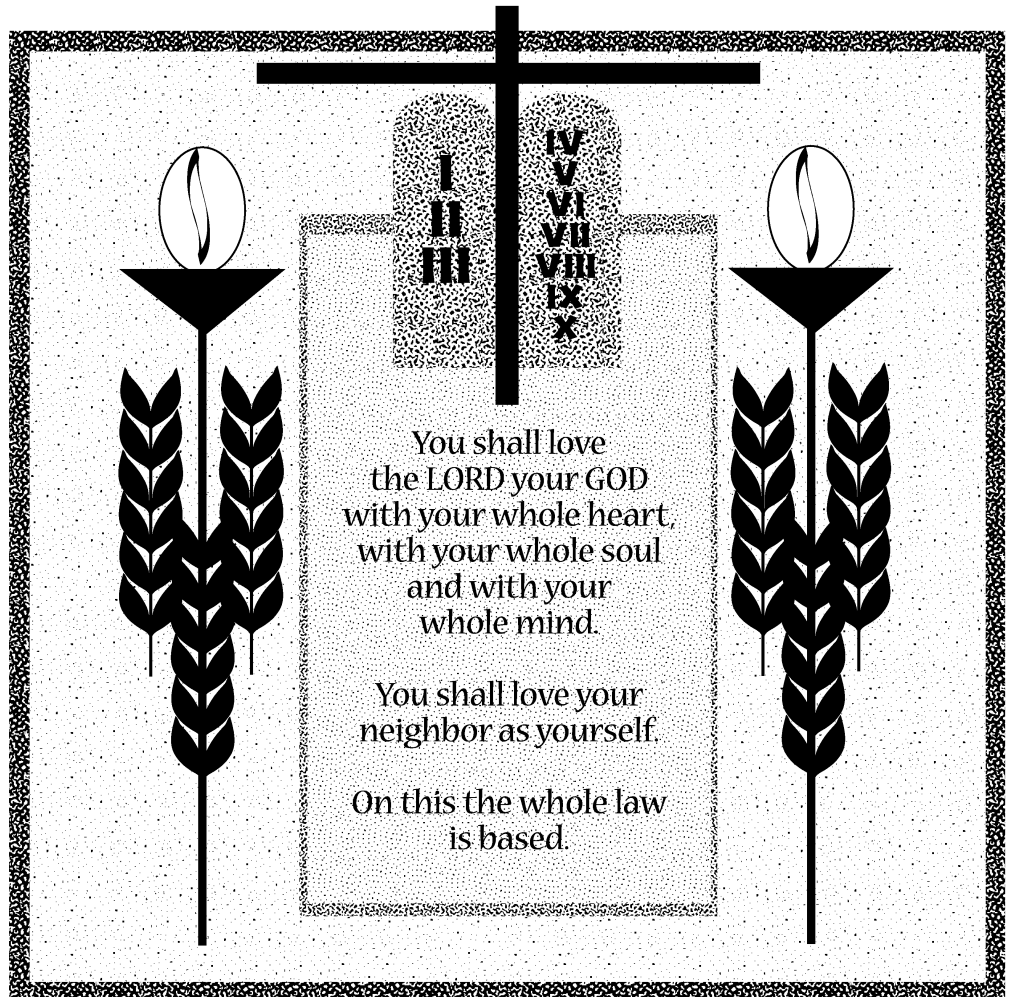

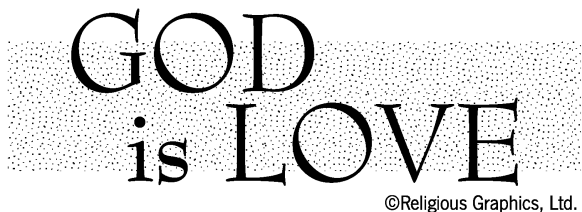

- All attendees must wear masks.

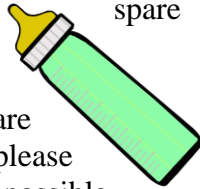

Pastor's Perspective: When Later Becomes Impossible

Like many people, one of the ways I like to unwind at the end of the day is to see what's on Netflix. A show that has drawn my attention is called "Longmire." It's a detective/mystery show about a Sheriff in Wyoming and one of the main characters is his wife, although you really don't see her. She stays on a shelf in the kitchen inside of a tea box.

This is not an unusual spot for a loved one. The Star Tribune had an enlightening article a few years ago about the growing number of people who keep the remains of a loved one at their home, expecting to bury them later. However, sometimes later almost becomes impossible. This is due to many factors, including indecision on the best resting place, waiting for a spouse to pass away and be buried together, or the big surprise to me, guilt. After a while, it seems embarrassing (for whatever reason) to acknowledge that you just haven't been able to bury your loved one. So what happens?

There are a wide variety of results, but I can't encourage you enough: If you have an urn with a loved one's remains at home, there is no better time than the present to look into a burial. Giving someone a final resting place is a blessing to the person, their memory, and to the family because it brings closure and gives a place to visit to pay your respects. While the urn stays on the mantel, the person becomes a decoration. Yet the fact remains that there is a body in your home. I know that sounds crass, but there is something about cremation that makes us think differently about death.

As we approach All Souls' Day, we are invited to pray for the salvation of the faithful departed. If you have not already done so, take this opportunity to lay them to rest as well. It is one last act of kindness we can offer those who have given so much to us. We will have a special Mass on All Souls' Day, November 2, at 7pm at St. Rose to pray for all those who have gone before us.
